School Is In Session At The Scioto Co. JVS

The School District now has use of the entire facility. Students and Staff are enjoying the updated and expanded learning center. It took a little over two years to complete, but the project was well worth the wait. I believe this was one of the first Vocational Schools to qualify for State Funding from OSFC. In addition to the beautiful improvements, the students now have access to state of the art technology in each classroom. With the exception of completing the security work on about 5-doors needing replaced, Mike Snipes and Dave Nichols have wrapped up the loose ends on this project.

SSU's University Center Renovations Continues

SSU took over the new South Addition to the University Center, in August. Students are now enjoying the new Cafeteria and large dining room, as well as the offices and large event room on the second floor. This is a beautiful facility, that has a special appeal to students from all over. The new "Oval" at the front of the building was recently opened to students. There are a few things to finish in this area, but work has shifted to renovating the existing building now. The entire project is expected to be completed in December of this year. This project includes a new process for the cooling system in the building. Water from an underground river beneath the rear parking lot is pumped up and passes through air handling equipment, which cools the air being distributed throughout the University Center. Once the water has passed through the cooling equipment, it is pumped on to the Ohio River. This system has been working great so far. There are already plans to extend this process into several other buildings on campus. This should provide quite a savings in the electric usage for SSU, and will probably initiate energy saving changes to cooling systems in many other State Universities. Led by Danny Beekman, the following workers are currently on site: Dan Maple, John Hill, Kenny Stewart, Tim Literal, Eddie Nichols, Dave Nichols, Chris Fowler, & Tammie Puckett. As of this date, there have been no serious injuries reported on this project. That's always welcome news!

Ironton Metropolitan Housing Authority Gets New Site Lighting

Work has begun on this project. Led by Bill Mershon, Ed Sommer & Will Mershon are hitting it hard. The Owner wants us to be done by Thanksgiving. This project consists of replacing the existing site lighting system with new light poles and fixtures, at three IMHA housing facilities in Ironton, Ohio. We will be working with Portco, Inc. on this project. This is the first stimulus money funded project we've received a contract for.

ACP PROJECT Shuts Down!

Task Order work on the ACP Project in Piketon came to a halt in August. The plant was recently described as "looking like a ghost town". Things shut down after the Obama Administration announced the President would not sign the loan guarantee for the continued progress of this project. We laid off 23-Workers on this project. We still have Pete Nichols, Mike Cantrell, and Chad Hawes on site, but we do not know how much longer this will last. There is talk of our completing a fiber optic cable installation project we were preparing to start in August. If this does happen, we will be manning up for this project. We are hopeful this massive project will get back on track very soon, but we have not heard anything promising yet.

We recently received the go ahead to install a new 400 Amp Electric Service, for the Columbia Music Hall. Owner Lee Scott has plans for an open air music hall at the former Columbia Theatre. Work is starting today, on the first panel. Andy Eldridge and Mike Hunt are working on this project.

What we've bid, and will be bidding...

- We turned in a bid on the Fleming County Courthouse Project in September. Glenwood Electric was the low bidder on this project.
 - On October 2, 2009, we bid a Security Camera Project for Lett Terrace and Miller Manor Apartments, owned by PMHA. Southern Ohio Communications was the low bidder on this project. We were the second and only other bidder.
 - J & H Erectors was the low bidder on the 8/4/09 bid for the Fire Alarm & Call System Replacement Project for the PMHA's Hudson House and Alexandria House Apartment buildings. We were the only other bidder on this project.
 - Denier Electric was the low bidder on the renovations project at the Portsmouth KDMC Medical Office Building that bid in September.
 - The SOMC Cafeteria and Kitchen Renovations project bid in August. T.L. Blackburn Construction Company was awarded the project. Hatzel & Buehler Electric had the low subcontractor bid.
 - Bids were received but over the budget, on the Animal Hospital being built by Shawnee Animal Clinic, in front of Clay High School. This project will be bid at a later date, unknown at this time.
 - Bids for the new office suites being built at SOMC were opened in September. Dixon Electric was awarded this project.
 - We will be bidding the Electrical package on the Clay Local School District's new K-12 School facility. We've been told the plans would be out later this year.
 - We are planning on bidding the new K-12 School facility, for New Boston Local School District. We've been told these plans would be out sometime next year.
 - We were the low bidder on the Electrical package for the Nile Township Fire Station to be built on US Route 52, West of State Route 125; adjacent to the Nile Township Community Center. We are still waiting on this project to be awarded. We've been told the trustees are waiting for the stimulus money.
 - We bid the Electrical work on the Portsmouth Waste Water Treatment Plant Upgrade Project in August. This project is being done with stimulus money. As of this date, no contracts have been awarded. The City is rebidding Contract IV of this project, which is for the SCADA System. Bids are due on October 6, 2009. We will be bidding on this project as well.
 - We were the low bidder on the new ODNR Watercraft Office being built at the Green-up Locks and Dam, adjacent to the Rest Area on the Ohio side of the dam. We received a contract for the Electrical, last week.
 - We will be bidding the electrical package for Washington-Nile's new Middle School. We've been told the plans will be available sometime in October 2009.
